June 8, 2009, and June 18, 2009.

Sand Point Education Center, Seattle Washington.

**President DB called the meeting to order and welcomed the membership shortly after 7pm.**

DB suggested that the agenda be changed so that the Election Committee Report would follow the Officer Reports. There was no objection.

May 11, 2009 minutes – ***TJ moved that we approve the minutes from May 11, '09 as distributed in the agenda packet. . JB 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Motion passed by unanimous vote.***

**President's Report** – This past year Emerald City FC is proud of the following accomplishments:

**1. Growth:** This has been a year of tremendous growth from Emerald City. At the urging of SYSA we managed a successful transition from 29 teams to 39 teams – a 35% expansion of the club. Our Parent Surveys, that are taken every year, indicate an increase in the overall satisfaction with the club with some of the highest marks coming from the parents of these new teams.

**2. Success on the field:** In the Girls Championship Cup the F92G team won the tournament and will be headed to Regionals in California June 15 – 21. In cup play for the boys, of our 5 older age boys teams, 3 made it to the finals.

**3. Player Development:** This year, as in the past several years, we have focused on player development: Many of our players participate in ODP, and as usual the majority of our graduating U-18 players went on to play in college.

**4. Scholarships:** 36 full and partial scholarships awarded, totaling over \$40,000.

**5. Added to our Coaching Director team:** We re-signed Bobby Howe, a preeminent soccer authority in our State, with a new multi-year contract as Coaching Director. Additionally we bolstered the Coaching Director team by adding Peter Fewing and Jon Matsushita, two highly respected and experienced coaches in the State.

**6. Player Education:** Throughout the year we organized and provided successful player development focused training opportunities for the kids of SYSA and ECFC.

**7. Coaching Education:** Emerald City Coaching Directors and senior coaching staff led coaching education seminars and license courses for SYSA and WSYS.



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**8. Hired a superb Business Manager:** In our continuing effort to professionalize the administration of the club we hired an experienced non profit manager in Mea Fishelis who has stepped in and made a positive impact on the club.

**9. Brand New Website:** It has been up for a couple of months now. It was actually through the process of hiring our Business Manager that we found a superb professional web designer. Together with a tremendous amount of volunteer work we are making that transition.

### Ongoing Challenges:

1. Parent education and communications.
2. Fields; Both total supply and scheduling.

### Challenges specific to this year:

#### Seattle United

As a consequence of this project, it appears that unfortunate divisions have surfaced, both within the SYSA itself and even within ECFC, which have detracted from our mission. Decisions are being made that appear to be based upon factors other than whether or not SYSA players or families will be best served.

The ECFC board and various members have expressed reservations about the SU process and about the proposed plan itself and it has been noted repeatedly that unless such comments are in direct support of core elements of the plan they are not given the attention they deserve.

A result of the process, whether intended or not, is that there have been disruptions and distractions in the continued administration of our club and in the continuing delivery of high quality soccer programming. The amount of time our board has spent discussing the Seattle United idea alone outside of the formal committee meeting is unfathomable.

It was suggested by an invited Shoreline representative at one of our recent board meetings that perhaps the whole Seattle United process was partially motivated by a sense of the SYSA board that ECFC may be overly involved or engaged in SYSA administration and/ or governance and that Seattle United was a mechanism to bring back greater control. ECFC has been a staunch supporter of the SYSA, but if the SYSA board of commissioners is of this opinion then perhaps the solution would be for the two to seek some level of disengagement.

Despite the challenges, ECFC has had a very strong year as already noted earlier, and we are particularly proud of our teams and our coaches, including some great new hires. We have had success on the field, administrative evolution, and very satisfied members, as evidenced in parent surveys that show an overall satisfaction rating above 80%. This number has been trending higher from year to year, ever since Bobby Howe joined the club. We at Emerald City are looking forward to many continued future successes.

**Treasurer Report** – Treasurer JF handed out copies of his report which included the ECFC Balance Sheet as of March 31, 2009 and the 08-09 Budget Report and explained the highlights in some detail.

JF reported:

- 1) The club is in a strong financial position
- 2) As treasurer he is now very comfortable with the club financial reporting and processes.

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- 3) JF is pleased with the work being done by the business manager, Mea and the two members of the bookkeeping staff: Amy and Rita.
- 4) JF expects that the audit of the 08/09 financials will be completed shortly
- 5) JF reported that the remaining balance in our scholarship fund was \$20,179. We will need to raise more money to meet the coming year's needs.

### **VP Membership's Report** – President DB read VP of Membership KL's written report:

Some of the highlights of my work this past season include:

- facilitating the roll in of the SYSA club Metropolitan in to ECFC. This brought a number of new teams and coaches to Emerald City, primarily at the C and D team levels and this was accomplished to the great satisfaction of the players involved.
- Reviewed our annual surveys and reacted to member feedback and a review of the individual coach results with our coaching director-- gave him specific feedback to provide our coaches during their formalized review.
- Revised Coaching Director Bobby's contract review process to call for measurable goals and targets for him to achieve.
- Participated in goal setting sessions to set priorities for club activities
- Participated in the hiring process for the new business manager
- Participated in club wide roles and responsibility meetings
- Served as chairperson of the finance committee
- Spent numerous hours on the new uniform contract and the vendor selection

In addition to these specific items, as Vice President of Membership this past year, I have tried to ensure that the process for feedback is utilized to resolve concerns and conflicts with our members. Sometimes to the satisfaction of the members, sometimes not.

If I could ask the membership to do one thing for our new incoming VP of Membership, it is to utilize the process. Bring your concerns to your parent rep, then through the VP of Membership who will work with the Board and the Coaching Directors to view the problems. Enhancing the process and ensuring that all of our members are treated equally and consistently has been my ongoing goal and often my biggest challenge. Until we all agree to work through the system—members, board members, coaches and coaching directors alike, the system that could serve us so well will not be as effective.

This year has been very frustrating as a volunteer board member. I am very concerned and quite frankly embarrassed by the conduct of a small subset of our Emerald City Membership, the SYSA President and SYSA Board of Commissioners and even the President of Washington Youth Soccer. Our organization elects its board and is fortunate to have a structure that calls for elected representation. That causes problems for those who don't agree with the majority and it appears they are left to attempt other means to accomplish their agendas. I will miss working on behalf of the Emerald City players and I am grateful (with an understanding that those who haven't served do not have) for those willing to serve our players.

### **Volunteer Coordinator's Report** – TJ gave his report as follows:

- He had worked on developing a definition of role / job description
- Participated in SYSA program for volunteer development
- Held first club wide meeting of team volunteer coordinators
- Helped gather and coordinate volunteers for all club events including Turkey Shoot, Holiday Jamboree, Awards Night and Tryouts and participated as volunteer in all of those functions.

TJ described the following challenges in the year ahead:



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- need to (further) develop system to track volunteer hours
- persistent barriers: volunteer fatigue, economy, political atmosphere, us vs them, team vs club, inconsistent adherence to club rules, communications.

TJ reported that he had also:

- Served on the following ECFC committees:  
Financial aid, CD contract, Elections, Administrative Position (Business Manager)  
Uniform, CLUB Website, and ECFC Select (SYSA)
- Served on the Seattle United Steering committee.
- Dialed for dollars, leading A/R collections effort at the request of the board.

*The assembled membership joined JF in thanking TJ for his efforts helping to collect the A/R.*

**The Executive VP** had nothing further to report other than what had already been covered.

**Election Committee Report** – DB reported that the election committee has worked hard to run the best possible election given the time constraints created by the change in tryout schedules this year and has done a great job. Nonetheless, DB has been advised by ECFC's counsel that it would be advisable to extend the voting period in order to avoid any possible challenges. DB has been advised that best course of action would be to ensure that the membership has a minimum of 10, preferably 14 days in which to cast their ballots after public notice has been made of the slate of candidates. Such notice was made at the "meet the candidates" event on June 3. DB made the observation that this had been a learning process, that the club had never faced questions regarding our well established election procedures before, and that using the same yardstick it now appears that every SYSA election that he has participated in as SYSA commissioner for ECFC has not followed SYSA bylaws or state law since there had been no prior notice of candidates for SYSA board positions at all.

TJ then spoke as a member of the election committee. He explained the mechanics up to date. In Dec 2008 the board had recognized the conflict between tryout dates and the AGM and ECFC bylaws were amended in order to allow all of our members to participate in the election. It was the election committee understands that the election needed to be completed by the AGM. The election time table and schedule was the driven by the balance between needing to complete the election while attempting to maximize participation.. After the Midnight June 3<sup>rd</sup> registration deadline member registration data was downloaded from Bonzi and each member was assigned a unique code. Name information was then removed and email addresses and ballot codes were set up in the voting system. After this initial setup operational control was handed over to Mea, who subsequently changed passwords to prevent any access by anyone other than herself and the independent election supervisor/observer, SYSA Registrar Bob Sigley. Ballots were emailed by Mea to all email addresses of the 456 ECFC member who had registered as of June 3<sup>rd</sup>. As of June 8<sup>th</sup> about 40 more members have registered, and have not (yet) received ballots. As of noon June 8<sup>th</sup> Mea reported that she had received 208 ballots. After ECFC counsel advised to extend the voting period Mea was informed immediately. Mea reports that she has kept those provisional results sealed and other than herself and Bob S. no one has been informed of the results, with one exception: Mea had been told to give player rep candidates advance notice and she had told one of them that she had been elected as player rep, Mea then informed the player rep candidate that she had not yet actually been elected, but was leading in this provisional count. Last year there were a total of 209 ballots submitted with a larger number of teams and members, so this election has already achieved a higher participation rate than previous elections. Bob Sigley and Ed D'Allesandro were thanked for their willingness to participate as observers/supervisors.

***Motion made by TJ - Election to be left in Business Manager Mea's control with Bob S. supervising. Polling period to be extended until June 18<sup>th</sup> and all members who registered***

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***after that initial June 3<sup>rd</sup> up to and including ECFC's June 15<sup>th</sup> registration and payment deadline are to receive ballots and be encouraged to participate. Members to be informed of this and strongly encouraged to vote. There will be no changes to the existing list of candidates. Motion 2<sup>nd</sup> by Jim Lyle (member).***

Discussion – JF asked if the newly voted Coaching Rep's would stay the same and the answer was yes, their election had been completed by a separate process and wasn't disputed in any way.. Member question – Will only members who have not voted yet be allowed to vote? Board responded that that was correct, there is no reason to redo the whole election with over 200 ballots already cast . At the request of Michael Murphy President then read a letter from member Dave Richardson:

### QUOTE

*"I challenge the validity of this election. Washington law requires 10 days notice to the membership before an election can be held. The ten day period begins when the candidates are announced. This is so there is enough time for members of the club to consider who to vote for. This is a fundamental democratic principle. The Emerald City Bylaws require more - 14 days notice. In the case of this Board of Directors election, the entire club did not receive notice of the identity of the candidates until they received their ballots on Friday, June 5, 2009. Some forty or so members may have known on Wednesday, June 3, 2009, if they attended the candidates forum. Voting opened Friday, June 5, 2009 and closed Monday, June 8, 2009 at noon, the same day as the annual meeting. This means most club members received a maximum of three days notice of the candidates before they had to cast their votes. This notice period clearly violates Washington non-profit law and the club's bylaws.*

*You knew this was the case because I sent you an email on Sunday, May 31, 2009, letting you know that the proposed election violated Washington law. I provided the state statutes that you were proposing to violate. The President of Washington Youth Soccer, Doug Andreassen, told you to postpone the elections so you could hold them legally, with ample opportunity for people to run for the Board, and for the club to consider the qualifications of candidates. You chose to ignore the President's warning and instead filed a complaint against him to the national organization. You later claimed that postponing the election would violate the club's bylaws. The club's bylaws are clear that the annual meeting can be postponed if the Board of Directors has not been elected.*

*There are other violations of Washington law that I have informed you about, and which you have ignored. The election notice to members was by email. Washington law only allows email notice if the recipient has agreed to such notice. The election was conducted electronically. Washington law only allows elections to be conducted this way if the same is authorized in the Bylaws. I have asked you for a copy of the Bylaws or for where electronic voting is authorized and you have not responded. And the notice of the annual meeting, given May 30, 2009, was nine days prior to the meeting, rather than the 10 required by state law or 14 required by the Emerald City bylaws.*

*I am disappointed you have chosen to move forward with this election with only three days notice of the candidates to the membership, in clear violation of the law and Emerald City's own bylaws. We cannot possibly expect the kids to honor our charge to them to obey the Laws of*

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*the Game if we are not prepared to obey the laws of the state of Washington ourselves. Because you have failed to do so, I must regrettably challenge this election."*

There was some further discussion including TJ's question regarding who the letter was addressed to. DB said that the letter was addressed to and had been sent to the WSYSA President, the ECFC President and the ECFC Executive Vice President at 5:31 pm today June 8<sup>th</sup>.

Member Jim Lyle then asked DB if ECFC's counsel had any advice regarding electronic voting. DB replied that it had been discussed and that there was no concern given 5.3 of the ECFC Bylaws which read as follows:

*"The General Members shall elect the Directors that they are to vote for either by mail/electronic ballot or at the initial annual meeting of the Club for terms of two years. The Board of Directors shall create a nominating committee not less than two months prior to the Annual Meeting to prepare a slate of candidates for the General Membership Directors. The outgoing Board shall establish an election committee to determine the method of balloting and to conduct the election if it is not held at the annual meeting."*

DB stated that ECFC Counsel had advised that the main issue of concern was the period required for the consideration of candidates after they had been announced, which should be a minimum of 10 days preferably 14 days, which could be addressed by extending the balloting period. DB added that we had been advised to include language in our registration process which explicitly permitted all notices to be made via email, a change which had been implemented immediately.

***Vote on the motion regarding the election: - 21 yes votes (including affirmative votes from all board members present), 1 no vote and 1 abstaining vote.***

**Coaching Director Report – BH made his report as follows:**– During the last year Emerald City F.C. has become firmly established in the top five clubs in the state. Our F92 Green team won the Championship Cup and the M90 and M93 teams reached the finals of this competition. Our M92 White team reached the final of the Challenge cup and several other teams overachieved to reach the qualifying stages of either competition.

We have expanded and upgraded the experience levels of our coaching staff. Last year we hired Jon Matsushita as an Assistant Director and this year we added a second Assistant Director, Peter Fewing and a professional business manager, Mea Fischelis, to meet the demands of a growing, successful club. This year we shall have 38 teams.

We have expanded our methods of evaluating coaches and we have created more criteria to help our coaches meet the requirements of our strategic plan.

During the last four years we have made great strides to change the club from a team centered – coach in the center of the universe – philosophy towards a "feeling of club," player centric organization.

Teams of the same age and gender train together on a more regular basis and all the coaches in those age ranges discuss players' abilities, best training practices and player movement. Last year



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we saw the introduction of the Player Pass in the PDL which has made for an easier movement of players within our club.

We have stressed the importance of player management and team communication to our coaches and I am very pleased to report a very favorable approval rating from our constituents as a result.

We expanded our club last year and added teams some of which participated at district level. The parents of those teams in most cases were also very pleased.

We introduced a philosophy over three years ago which has formed the basis of our Mission Statement. Players are considered first in all our actions. We shall continue to pursue the path of excellence rather than the path of instant gratification and we have introduced rules, guidelines and policies to help our coaches achieve those goals within our philosophy.

**Business Manager Report – MF** – made a report as follows: “It is an interesting time to be a part of Seattle Youth Soccer in Seattle. I have been with Emerald City for 8 months and in that time frame I have been learning about the Club, getting to know the coaches, board members and members. I now have a good knowledge of the systems and am looking for ways to make improvements.

I am taking over administrative duties from the Coaching directors which have allowed them to focus on matters related to coaching. I am doing the same for the board which will allow the board members to focus more on policy, fundraising and governance issues.

I have enjoyed the past 8 months and look forward to creating a greater consistency in the management of the club and better communication to the membership. “

**Coaches Rep Report – JB** – Last Saturday ECFC Coaching Director BH held coaches seminar. 20 coaches attended. It was an educational seminar, both on and off the field and was very much appreciated by all the coaching staff.

**Player Rep. Report – CP** – really just an observer this past year. In the future, he would recommend an online social networking aspect to the club so that players could be more aware of the player reps.

**SYSA Commissioners Report – DB** went over the last SYSA meeting that was held on June 1, '09. He explained the proposed Seattle United Related changes to SYSA's Bylaws and Rules amendments, which consists of 3 parts:

- 1) A proposed amendment to SYSA bylaws including 3.5.1 which would delete Emerald City FC and substitute Seattle United as SYSA's premier club.
- 2) A proposed set of rule changes including SYSA Rule 7.2, which would make Seattle United the exclusive provider of select teams in the SYSA for U-11 to U-14 age groups, hence potentially forcing most existing ECFC teams and members to join this new entity.
- 3) The adoption of the proposed Seattle United Operating Plan and formation of this new entity.

Having read the proposed amendments at the June 1, 2009 meeting, the SYSA Board of Commissioners was now preparing to vote on these changes on **July 9<sup>th</sup> 2009**.

Disussion questions included:

- 1) MF had asked the SYSA ED how could bylaws adopt a new club that didn't exist yet?

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- 2) What would the financial effect be on the remaining ECFC club / teams given the loss of revenue from the teams forced to join the new entity.
- 3) Should ECFC have a referendum or poll for our own membership in regard to Seattle United? Copies of proposed question were distributed. Members present expressed widespread enthusiasm for the idea
- 4) Could the ECFC board hold team meetings to educate parents about Seattle United?
- 5) How could the SYSA do this given that the ECFC membership wasn't properly educated and that a final plan had only recently been completed and these changes proposed? Lots of confusion regarding consequences. Most members have no idea that this plan would be involuntary.
- 6) TJ asked how the other SYSA clubs could possibly have educated their members and gotten consensus given that their registrations were not yet open and ECFC had only learned who our members were in the preceding two weeks and hence had only been able to contact them very recently. Most SYSA clubs don't open registrations until July 15.
- 7) What was the WSYSA's position on these proposed changes? WSYSA President Doug Andreassen had been invited to the ECFC town hall meeting on June 3<sup>rd</sup> and to this AGM on June 8<sup>th</sup> but hadn't responded to the invitations.

TJ suggested that the board must focus on concrete actions, what did the membership recommend? Members present suggested:– 1) Way to Educate ( within teams, practices, tournaments, etc.), 2) Referendum question, 3) Summarize the operational plan of SU to one page and get it out to the members (should be accurate and not ECFC centric). 4) All members of this new Seattle United club should be able to vote on the Bylaw and Rule changes that SYSA is pushing for". 5) "what direction do we want our club to be moving in, can we work with SYSA".

BH – commented that there is a way to unite Seattle, with #3 on the Poll question draft. With cooperation and good communication. He has been involved with soccer for 47 years and stated that soccer is a 'evolutionary process' and these proposed changes wouldn't be beneficial for player development.

***Motion made by member Jim Lyle: The ECFC Board is encouraged to seek legal counsel and to utilize all other resources to find a means to postpone the proposed Bylaw changes of SYSA, and to improve the Seattle United proposal through collaboration. MD (Michael Donogan) 2<sup>nd</sup> motion. 20 yes votes (including all board members present), 3 abstaining, 0 no.***

***Member Jim Lyle made motion to temporarily adjourn the annual meeting and reconvene on June 18<sup>th</sup>, '09, Thursday at 7pm at Sand Point Education Center to receive the election results. MK (Mark Koski) 2<sup>nd</sup> motion. 21 yes (including all board members present), 1 abstained, 0 no.***

### **Emerald City FC Annual General Meeting RECONVENED June 18, 2009. Sand Point Education Center, Seattle Washington.**

### **DB calls meeting to order at 7:03 pm**

DB distributed an agenda with 2 items; the election report and a presentation regarding US club Soccer. Since the US Club Soccer rep hadn't arrived yet, the election report was put to the top of the agenda and members were invited to review the letter that the ECFC board had received from Doug Andreassen on June 15<sup>th</sup> and the ECFC's reply on June 16<sup>th</sup>. (Attached )

After receiving the letter on June 15<sup>th</sup> Dan Barsher had immediately consulted with ECFC counsel and had scheduled an urgent meeting with WYS President Terry Fisher which was held on June 16<sup>th</sup> before drafting and sending the ECFC reply.

The ECFC board decided that it was in ECFC's member's best interests to proceed with the election for the following reasons:

- 1) As of June 15<sup>th</sup>, the election was just about completed, and there would be no benefit from not counting the ballots.
- 2) If for some reason the election was found by a judicial process to be invalid a new election could always be held at a future date. Newly elected board members could (and would) be designated as "interim" until final determination has been made.
- 3) ECFC had already complied with WYS's request to extend the balloting period and to appoint an independent observer.
- 4) WYS Executive Director Terry Fisher (or other WYS rep) had been invited to observe the ballot count and to attend this meeting.
- 5) The election had already surpassed all previous ECFC elections in regard to the number of contested positions, percentage of members casting ballots and participating and number of members attending our meet then candidates meeting.
- 6) The ECFC board has 2 vacancies and 4 board members' terms are expiring (Coaches rep, VP of Membership and Coaches Rep). Not proceeding with the election would leave the ECFC board without a quorum and unable to serve the membership at a critical time.
- 7) ECFC was committed to giving its members a choice to cast votes for candidates who expressed strong support for Seattle United and others who didn't, in order to give the future board direction in regard to this issue of IMMEDIATE importance due for a vote on July 9<sup>th</sup>, 2009. Delaying the election until after July 9<sup>th</sup>, 2009 would not allow the members to "speak" on this issue.

These reasons were discussed with WYS Executive director Terry Fisher in the meeting on June 16<sup>th</sup> and ECFC counsel also advised that ECFC should proceed.



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In discussion a member asked if WYS had ever articulated a specific grievance or concerns regarding ECFC governance, DB was not aware of any specifics.

Business Manager Mea Fischelis then reported the election results. She gave an overview of the process which culminated in two independent ballot counts, one by her and one by Bob Sigley, the independent observer. There were 251 ballots cast. Both identified 3 test ballots and 2 duplicate ballots which were not counted, and which would not have affected the results. Both arrived at exactly the same results. Mea then opened the envelope with the results and announced the results as follows:

VP of Membership: Jeanne Sulieman

Girls Player Rep: Angela Fischer

Boys Player Rep: Chris Perkins

General Board Positions: Dan Barsher, Jonathan Fischer, Ruth Nicholson, Joe Picciano

Bob Sigley will send a formal report to the ECFC Board.

Members who had run for office but who had not been elected were thanked for their willingness to serve.

It was noted that the new board will need to meet ASAP to elect officers.

Attending outgoing board members Karen Launceford and Ann Woolfrey were thanked for their service.

### US CLUB SOCCER

Emerald City parent and Puget Sound Premier League President Stanley Holmes was invited to give a brief presentation on US Club Soccer.

He explained how the "youth system" (WYS) and US Club were parallel systems which were both officially sanctioned, offered insurance benefits, and how dual registration was common.

He explained the primary difference was that US Club Soccer was less bureaucratic and was national organization that didn't interfere in local decisions, leaving leagues and clubs free to make the best possible decisions locally, in the interests of clubs and most importantly player development. He described the recent rapid growth in California and elsewhere and gave a brief history of the local PSPL league with U-10 to U-14 divisions. US Club also offers cost advantages in addition to flexibility.
